



CVMIC Initiative for Our Law Enforcement Members

The CVMIC Board of Directors and CEO Ken Horner have announced providing each of our police department members with two doses of Narcan®; the intended use is staff intervention during drug testing or to protect staff working in and around property and evidence storage rooms.

Police department members are asked to send a representative to one of the regional locations to receive the 2-dose pack. CVMIC Loss Control Specialist Rick Balistrieri (retired law enforcement) will be hosting four regional locations to distribute the Narcan® doses accompanied by a 1-hour training session on the use and application of Narcan®. Training is not required IF your agency has already received Narcan® training; it is being provided to members who will benefit from the “train the trainer” experience.



We encourage our members to pick up the Narcan® doses during one of the following opportunities:

November 27th from 8 am to 12 noon at the Menasha Police Department (Training Room), 430 1st. St. The 1-hour Train the Trainer event will begin at 9 am. CVMIC members may pick up their Narcan® doses any time from 8 am – 12 noon.

November 28th from 8 am to 12 noon at Sun Prairie Utilities Building, 125 W. Main St. The 1-hour Train the Trainer event will begin at 9 am. CVMIC members may pick up their Narcan® doses any time from 8 am – 12 noon.

November 30th from 8 am to 12 noon at the Wausau Police Department, 515 Grand Ave. The 1-hour Train the Trainer event will begin at 9 am. CVMIC members may pick up their Narcan® doses any time from 8 am – 12 noon.

December 6th from 12 noon to 4 pm at the CVMIC office in Wauwatosa, 9898 W. Blue Mound Rd. The 1-hour Train the Trainer event will begin at 1 pm. CVMIC members may pick up their Narcan® doses any time from 12 noon to 4 pm.

Naloxone, also known by the trade name Narcan®, is a prescription medication that reverses heroin and prescription opiate overdoses. Naloxone blocks the effects of heroin and opiates on the brain and reverses overdoses. During an overdose, people stop breathing. Naloxone helps to restore breathing, ultimately saving lives. NARCAN® (naloxone HCl) Nasal Spray is the first and only FDA-approved nasal form of naloxone for the emergency treatment of a known or suspected opioid overdose.
